FORMULAS for SUCCESS

Up Close and Personal Photos capture action and reaction as well as personality - to guarantee this, shoot within four or five feet. Practice photographing all subject matter from a variety of angles within that four-five foot radius. Shoot your subject in a clockwise pattern - begin shooting at 3 o'clock to the subject and move yourself from 3 to 6 and 9 and so on until you have captured all aspects of the action and/or reaction for the assignment.

Steady does it. The body was made to be the perfect camera tripod - feet shoulder-width apart and elbows locked into the waist make a steady balance for your camera. Practice keeping your left hand flat for the camera to rest on and your right hand wrapped for the focus and setting controls. By locking in your elbow, you will stablize your camera.

Ready to go. Your camera is an extension of your body and your creative vision. Have it ready at all times and easily accessible. The best shots happen at the spur of the moment and your camera needs to see the same as your eye.
